It saddens me to think in years to come we might lose an event not because of lack of support or because it lost money, but because there was no one to organise it.

supporters around the country and thank
them for their support and discuss any
important matters. I was warned by a few
past Presidents that it gets very busy
towards the end of the year and trying to

membership on my Christmas list.

On the subject of keeping healthy, I am pleased to report that the Society is in good health, our investments are doing well and despite the current situation on the stock market where the slightest comment seems to have a major effect on world markets, our portfolio is doing well. All this is down to our investment managers at Smith & Williamson in Birmingham and also to Pippa Latham and John Taylor, who is also TTBS National Vice-President in 2019 and 2020. Their expertise in looking after the Society's interests is second to none, and I would like to thank them on behalf of the Society for doing such a good job for us.

Having sat on the Board of Management for over 20 years I am well aware of trade gossip regarding the growth in value of our investments. However, as we have seen in the past few months how jittery the stock market can be over the slightest comment, one hopes that in the event of a rainy day when we may need to draw on these funds, that we will be gratified that our portfolio has done so well.

One must not forget that these funds have been built up over 120 years and are needed to guarantee the long term support from the Society, as I believe in the future the help provided by the TTBS will be needed even more.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to thank all our supporters for their efforts during 2019, and to wish them and all our beneficiaries a very happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year.
