National President's autumn message

s I am now well into my second term of office, I should be looking forward to a very busy period as normally there are several dinner dances in October and November, followed by the busiest time of year, the Christmas lunch season. Sadly, one by one each has had to be cancelled due to the ongoing Covid-19 virus situation.

For us in Liverpool and the North West, we have had to cancel both our Liverpool

events – the Gala night which is held in November and our Christmas lunch. Both these events have run without failure for well over 40 years and have always raised magnificent sums for the Society, but more importantly they have always managed to bring the trade together, being always extremely well supported.

I am well aware many events were cancelled earlier in the year in the hope there may be a chance they could take place later on in the year, however, the second wave of Covid-19 cases and recent Government restrictions have meant any thoughts of rearranging anything have gone out the window.

Many major industry events tend to take place towards the year end and one of the most enjoyable is the Shipper's luncheon, which usually takes place the day before the NPPD annual dinner in London.

Sadly this too has fallen foul of the virus and I know this will disappoint many in the trade, as it is an excellent event for networking and meeting up with many of our customers and having a social drink or two! It has for the past few years been a sellout as well, which must make this doubly frustrating for the organisers.

I know from all my years supporting trade functions that the timber industry greatly enjoys the functions and the opportunity to network. I suspect with all events being cancelled since March and the outlook through to the early part of next year not looking to good, it means there will be many sad faces within our industry.

As I mentioned in the spring newsletter, the Society was likely to lose all of the income generated from the various regional functions usually held during most of the year. Sadly this has happened and one of the first casualties was the TTBS National Golf day, which is probably our major fund-raising event of the year.

On top of this, as most of the markets we invest in have reduced or cancelled payment of any dividends for this year, this has put further pressure on our resources. However, in the recent months there has been a reasonable improvement in most of the share prices, so it is not all doom and gloom.

Once we can get back to normality, we will endeavour to replace the money we are now having to use from our investments, to get them back to the level required, and I know we will receive the full support of all our friends and supporters in the trade to help us achieve this.

We had to postpone the Society's AGM which takes place every May at the magnificent RAF Club in London and initially it was hoped we could hold it later in the year, but that has not been possible.



TTBS general manager celebrates milestone

TTBS general manager, Ivan Savage reached a milestone of 60 years unbroken service in the timber industry this October.

Born in November 1943 in Hove, Sussex, the youngest son of Ronald and Yvonne Savage, Ivan was educated initially in Hove and subsequently Bognor Regis, where he moved due to his father's transfer within the Rank Organisation. After 11 plus, he

completed his education at Chichester High School, a highly respected grammar school in the heart of Chichester.

He started work in the timber industry in October 1960 as a management trainee with A Olby & Sons Ltd at their main softwood depot in Bognor Regis (now part of the Cover Group) and in 1976 he moved to Staffordshire to join Cox Long Ltd (now part of the Walker Group) until 1983.

Following a short period as senior training officer at the Timber Research & Development Association (TRADA) in High Wycombe, he returned to the Midlands to join ex Cox Long colleagues at S Jackson (Walsall) Ltd and was appointed as their sales director.

In August 1993, S Jackson was purchased by the Carver Group in Wolverhampton and in 1994, Ivan was appointed as the Carver Group sales director, the first non-family director in nearly 100 years, a position he held until his semi-retirement in November 2008, when he continued as a director of ETS Ltd until 2011, when, with his appointment by the Trustees he took up the position of general manager for the "timber trades' own charity".

During his years at Carvers, the Wolverhampton group increased sales to over £33m and expanded into timber engineering with design and supply of engineered timber joist sets, trussed rafter manufacture with their subsidiary Engineered Timber Solutions Ltd, Rodington and timber framed production

with Timber Kit Solutions Ltd, Shrewsbury.

Throughout the 1980s and 90s, Ivan was a prolific distance runner and triathlete and competed in 29 marathons, including Amsterdam and five London marathons and over 130 open water triathlons as well as many other long distance road races and fell running events.

He was secretary of Stone Master Marathoners veterans athletic club and also secretary of the North Staffordshire Triathlon club for many years and a member of the British Triathlon Association. He was also a keen walker, completing the 192 mile Wainwrights Coast to Coast in 1993, together with many other UK long distance pathways.

Together with the late Roy Carver, in 1998 Ivan revived the Wolverhampton City Marathon, supported by the Carver Group, which has continued for over 20 years and has raised over £400,000 for local Wolverhampton charities – sadly the Covid-19 pandemic has put an end to this event this year.

Outside of his full time TTBS work and industry responsibilities, Ivan is a member of Stone Golf Club in Staffordshire and continues to enjoy competitive golf with his playing partners.

Sixty years of unbroken service within the timber industry has been an exceptional achievement and Ivan has indicated that he will continue with the TTBS for some while yet before considering retirement, subject to continued good health.

TTJ Awards go online to recognise excellence



The TTJ Awards were held online

Howarth Timber Group was named *TTJ* Timber Trader of the Year 2020 at this year's *TTJ Awards* on Friday September 25.

The Awards, a virtual event this year due to the Covid-19 pandemic, is the timber industry's annual awards event, rewarding companies across the sector for customers service, product quality, product range, deliveries and value for money.

This year the event also featured a Covid-19 industry response film, a focus on new campaign Wood Co₂sts less and a short film on the American Hardwood Export Council's Connected project about designing furniture for working from home during the pandemic.

It also featured a film of National Timber Group directors, Peter Howarth and Richard Jarvis completing the Timber Trade Corona Cut Challenge. They encouraged other people from the timber sector to donate their unspent, lockdown haircut money to the TTBS and Cancer Research UK.

Peter and Richard raised £5,003, which was split between the two charities.

A lively online networking lounge and fund-raising for the Timber Trades' Benevolent Society – during which £838 was raised – also featured at the event, which saw Combilift as the Headline Sponsor.

Glennon Brothers won Softwood Trader of the Year, James Latham scooped the Hardwood Trader of the Year and Falcon Panel Products was the winner of the Panels Trader of the Year.

English Woodlands Timber won Small Timber Business of the Year, while Howarth Timber & Building Supplies was voted the best in Timber Merchant of the Year and Dale Joinery scooped Joinery Product Supplier of the Year. Howarth Timber Engineered Solutions won the Structural Timber Systems Supplier of the Year

Neil Donaldson was awarded the *TTJ* Lifetime Achievement Award (*see right*).

"It was great to unite together in a different, virtual way this year," said Stephen Powney, *TTJ* editor. "This year has been a difficult time for many businesses, so it was all the more important to come together and celebrate something positive in the industry."

Neil Donaldson's long career in the timber industry has been recognised with a *TTJ* Lifetime Achievement Award.

Mr Donaldson retired from James Donaldson & Sons in the summer, after 45 years with the business, and handed over the reins to the sixth generation.

Mr Donaldson took over from his father as managing director in 1985 and during his tenure, he has overseen the expansion of Donaldson's from a small business in Fife, Scotland, to a national company, operating from 31 sites across the UK.

In 1988 he became the first Scottish chairman of TRADA. He was also president of the Scottish Timber Trade Association from 2004 - 2006 and president of the Timber Trade Federation from 2006 - 2008.
